RITT FIRM INCORPORATES STEP PRELIMINARY TO ERECTION OF GLASS BUILDING FOR AUTO SHOW ROOM. Location to be on Central Ave. Building Work to Start Soon.

The Franklin-Ritt firm, dealers in Franklin cars and trucks, located in the Lahr block, is now operating under the corporation laws of the state, having recently. incorporated with a capital stock of \$30,000, shares \$500 each.

The business of the company was established about three years ago by F. C. Ritt and has enjoyed a remarkable growth, a growth that has made an extensive expansion imperative.

Mr. Ritt announced that plans are being drawn for a new home for the company, to be located on one of the most desirable corners on Central avenue.

"There is nothing in this part of the state that will compare with it," he said. Continuing, he explained that the proposed new home will be a one story affair, 88x160 feet, constructed of steel and wire glass, resting on a concrete foundation.

Building operations, he said, are to start as soon as the preliminary arrangements have been perfected. The calculations are that the building can be gotten ready for occupancy in the early part of the coming summer. The stockholders are to meet some time this week to organize.

The Wisconsin Engineering & Construction company of Wausau received the contract for the erection of the Franklin-Ritt company's auto sales building at the northwest corner of Central avenue and Sixth street. The company's construction engineer, J. W. Nerhood, accompanied by William Ziebell, who will be the superintendent of the building operations, arrived in the city last week to start work on the erection of the structure which will be one story high with a plate glass front and rest on a concrete foundation. The Central avenue frontage will be 88 feet, while the depth of the building will be 160 feet. The contractors hope to have it completed in 60 days. The present building on the site, a two-story affair, will be embodied in the new structure.



The American National bank was the successful bidder in an auction sale of the building on the corner of South Central avenue and Sixth street this morning, now occupied by the Stewart Battery company, buying it for \$26,000, which is little more than half of the sum it cost to build three years ago.

Other bidders were C. E. Blodgett. who started the bidding with an offer of \$20,000, and I. P. Tiffault, whose bid was \$25,000.

The building, originally built for the Franklin Ritt Automobile company with C. A. Schubert as manager. The business conducted was an agency for Franklin automobiles and service station. In the reorganization several local business men became connected with it.


The venture did not prove successful and last year it was declared bankrupt. Since that time the building has been occupied by the Stewart company and the Brooks Tire shop.

It was not stated what change, if any, would be made in the building or its occupancy.

The purchase of the building. formerly occupied by the Marshfield-Franklin company, by the American National bank, settled differences arising from that standpoint, although the bank has at present in its possession a number of Franklin cars and accessories upon which they will make claim.

Atty. P. A. Williams of this city represented the Marshfield-Franklin company, the bank being represented by the firm of Goggins, Brazeau and Goggins of Wisconsin Rapids.
